A SESQUICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION AS LUDLOW CELEBRATES 150 YEARS


Happy Birthday Ludlow!! One hundred and fifty years deserves a celebration... maybe even more than one. Ludlow's sesquicentennial kicked off on February 20th, the actual day of the city's founding in 1864, with a party at the old Ludlow Theater hosted by Circus Mojo. And then on May 17th, the celebration continued with a dedication ceremony and marker unveiling at Somerset Hall recording Ludlow's very first historical marker. A Ludlow community outing at Coney Island in Cincinnati and a 5K run sponsored by the Ludlow Civic Club were two more ways that Ludlow celebrated its 150th birthday.

And now for our biggest celebration to date. On Sunday, September 14th, a weeklong party begins with a piano performance. Christiaan Kuyvenhoven, a world-renowned Dutch pianist will perform at the First Baptist Church of Ludlow located at 400 Linden Street. This performance begins at 2pm and the cost is \$10.

And then on Friday, September 19th, Ludlow will host a three-day festival to remember the past and celebrate the future by honoring our history through a party to observe one hundred and fifty years. Each day of this festival will host its own schedule of special events, but first take a look at what you will find every day during festival hours at the City Park located on 600 Elm Street. 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The Ludlow Legacy: The City History in 12 Chapters

Chapter 9: "The Atomic Age"

The decade of the 1960's was a time of civil unrest and social upheaval. War raged in Vietnam and Southeast Asia, and scenes were broadcast nightly on the evening news, with the wounded and dead carried on stretchers across the television screen. Anti-war protests erupted across the country.

At the same time, racial tensions resulted in riots and marches. Violent confrontations occurred in cities across America, including Cincinnati, and threatened to spread into neighboring towns like Ludlow.

Perhaps more than anything else, the assassinations of Martin Luther King; Robert F. Kennedy and President John F. Kennedy defined those dark years. For the first time in history, Americans could watch and mourn the funeral of their slain president from their living room.

Ludlow had its own memorable events of the 1950's/60's. Some events worth noting include the development of the area known as "Ludlow Heights" (Hazen Street); the demolition of the old Mary A. Goetz Elementary School building in 1957; and the annual Ludlow Day at Coney Island, with the steamboat Avalon providing transportation.

However, there are two major events of the time that stand out among the rest.

One was the devastation of Ludlow's largest fire...the Duro Fire of March, 1964. The Duro Bag Company occupied a 500-foot long building which stretched between Carneal and Davies Streets. It was quickly engulfed by flames in the early morning hours of Sunday, March 1st, 1964. The fire spread across Cedar Alley to engulf several homes in the 200 block of Oak Street. Eleven fire departments battled the blaze, which consumed the Duro Building and eight homes. As a result, several families were left unemployed. The estimated financial loss was \$2.1 million dollars.

The other Ludlow memory of that decade is a pleasant one.

Even to this day, fifty years later, it's the one Ludlow event of the 1960's that everyone remembers...the Ludlow Centennial Celebration of 1964.



The festivities began with the Coronation Ball at Covington's Lookout House.

The Southern Railroad's "Best Friend of Charleston", a replica of the original steam-powered locomotive, was in Ludlow during the days of the Centennial celebration.

For four nights "The Ludlow Story", a "mammoth historical drama depicting Ludlow's history", was presented at Rigney Stadium with a "cast of 300." The drama, comprised of ten acts, reenacted the city's story from the arrival of early settlers to the "atomic age".

Multiple parades took place during the Centennial, including the "Kiddies' Pet and Decorated Vehicle Parade"; the Northern Kentucky Fire Department Parade, and the "Mammoth Centennial Parade".

Other events included fireworks and rides and tours of Mrs. Thomas' Candy Kitchen at Elmwood Hall.

A printed souvenir program of, appropriately, 64 pages was offered, filled with Ludlow photographs and history and advertisements from local businesses. Letters of congratulations from

Mayor Stanley Martin and Kentucky Governor Edward Breathitt prefaced the booklet.

Many residents appeared daily in top hats or sunbonnets, becoming a memorable part of the spectacle. The schedule of events included competitions, such as the "Brothers of the Brush", for those men seeking the title of the best beard in town. For the ladies, there was the "Centennial Belle" fashion show.

The celebration attracted large crowds and much attention, drawing even former residents back to Ludlow to share the experience.

What made the Centennial such an unforgettable memory, drawing large crowds? Maybe the festivities offered a momentary escape from those anxiety-filled days, just months after the assassination of a president and a devastating fire. Perhaps in some ways it was a simpler time, like the black and white photographic images in an old scrapbook. Perhaps the bonds of family and community were stronger then, or just seem so with the passage of time.

Once more it is time to celebrate Ludlow's history and heritage. Let's make it worth remembering fifty years from now.





MAYORS OF LUDLOW

Tom Rose—Elected 1958

When asked what my favorite accomplishment was while Mayor, I would have to say it was expanding the boundaries of Ludlow. While I was Mayor, I became aware that the city limits of Ludlow were smaller than I thought. The houses on Deverill Street south of Adela including the land where the Ludlow-Bromley Swim Club now sits, the land on the west side of Lake Street including the old Lagoon property, and the land above Hazen Street where River's Breeze is belonged to Kenton County. I was able to successfully incorporate those areas into Ludlow thereby increasing the size of the city for future Development.

Buddy Waite—Elected 1966 and 1974

One of my favorite accomplishments as Mayor was being instrumental in organizing and forming the Northern Kentucky Municipal League, a mayor's organization, as we recognized the need for smaller cities to find a way to have more of a political voice. This organization still is in existence today. Also, during my tenure, I was able to provide better water pressure for residents and negotiate the best water rates of any city in Kenton County. Water rates in Ludlow did not raise for 17 years (until Kenton County took over water operations.) On a historical note, while Mayor, the City Council passed a referendum for Equipment Maintenance for the Ludlow Volunteer Fire Department, the first ever of its type in the Commonwealth. Another accomplishment was when I opposed Governor Breathitt's plans to change the Kentucky constitution that would have eliminated smaller cities in the Commonwealth and was honored by the State Senate for my efforts. I also was the first organizer for the annual Kid's Parade and the Christmas Parade. I love my hometown and am proud to have gone to school and played football there and lived there and to have been elected and given the chance to make it an even better place to live means a lot to me. Although I have had several notable accomplishments in my life including being past of President of the Ludlow Vets and being nominated and receiving the Man of the Year award, being elected mayor of my hometown of Ludlow has been one of the proudest moments of my life.

Ronald "Lefty" Pegg—Elected 1986

My favorite things about being mayor coincide with the things I had as a priority to accomplish if elected: improving the image of Ludlow's police, fire, and public works departments, improving the city's image by cleaning up housing, supporting the future of riverfront development and supporting the city's youth. While mayor, we rebuilt the image of the Ludlow Police and Public Works Departments by hiring top-notch employees. We also remodeled and added new fire bays and equipment for the Fire Department at no cost to the citizens of Ludlow. During my tenure as Mayor, Ludlow hired the first Building and Blight Inspector to ensure housing here met certain standards. Part of this was achieved through a Sidewalk Program where the city paid homeowner's to maintain sidewalks in front of their properties and an annual city-wide Clean Up program. I formed the first Riverfront Development Committee to study properties located along the river for future development projects. Finally, as Mayor, we established the Ludlow Youth Center, which was supported by citizen donations, had a Ludlow Youth Commission on Friday nights during the summer months to provide activities for kids, built dugouts at Lemker Field (block work was done by the vocational school), and we built a walking bridge to Carlisle Field to keep kids off of Sleepy Hollow Road when they were walking to the field. I also brought back the Halloween Block Party with the help of the Ludlow Business Association and Larry Tobe. We also gave out glow necklaces to help keep kids safe while trick or treating. All of these things went hand-in-hand with helping Ludlow become a Certified City in 1988 and winning a Beautification Award and being re-certified in 1989.

Tom Stacy—Elected 1998

Some of my favorite accomplishments as Mayor? Having the first sit down meeting with developers for the River's Breeze project at the Outback restaurant in Crescent Springs; Moving the council meetings to the Senior Center and how proud I felt making city business accessible to people with disabilities... (not being able to hike the stairs to the second floor of the fire house); Orchestrating the Ameristop business which opened the doors for the Riverside Market to be so successful .. And the funniest thing? Driving the bobcat to fill the city truck with salt for the icy streets!

Ed Schroeder—Elected 2002 and 2006

In 2001, Ed Schroeder was asked by the Ludlow City Council to assume the role of Mayor. The city had gone through some difficult times and needed a consensus builder to keep the city moving in a positive direction. Ed came out of retirement and won re-election in two subsequent elections. During his years in office, the city progressed tremendously. These efforts were accomplished with the teamwork of the city council, city staff and residents. Among his early duties was to help break ground for the River's Breeze Community on Pigeon Point above Hazen Street. This condominium complex has added greatly to the health of the community and has brought many new residents to the city. During Ed's tenure, the initial footprint of River's Breeze was expanded with the construction of several new buildings that had not been part of the original plan. Just to name a few of the other accomplishments during these years: A full-time professional city manager was hired, grants were received to greatly improve the streetscape of Ludlow's business district along Elm Street including new sidewalks, historic lighting, etc., the old Ludlow Christian Church was acquired and remodeled into a municipal center, a tax levy was passed to keep the Ludlow Volunteer Fire Department and ambulance service in operation and professional EMT's were added to the paid staff. Good progress was also made in developing the business district, including the initial plans for the new Ludlow Family Pharmacy and Riverside Marketplace. Ed also heightened Ludlow's profile by becoming active in regional organizations. He was a contributing member of the Kenton County Mayor's group. In addition, during his tenure as Mayor, Ludlow became a member of SouthBank. Ludlow also joined the other Northern Kentucky urban cities in the HOME consortium, which resulted in a number of homes being rehabbed in the city. These are just a few examples of how Ed worked to bring about cooperative solutions to city problems.

Ken Wynn—Elected 2010

I am your current Mayor. A lifelong resident of Ludlow, I got involved in our city government because I wanted to make positive changes in our community that benefit all of our residents and see our city grow and prosper. Since being your Mayor, I was able to facilitate the opening of our grocery store with the help of my predecessor, Mayor Ed Schroeder. We have encouraged new businesses to come to Ludlow, such as Subway and Pizza Hut. My family made an investment in our community by opening the Wynners Cup Café. I take a lot of pride in the coffee shop and I hope it serves as a model for future businesses as the city continues to build our business district. The things I have mentioned above could not have happened if it was not for the wonderful city staff and a supportive council. Every accomplishment has been a group effort.

Letter From the Superintendent

Our 2014-2015 school year is off to a great start! It's nice to have students back in our school buildings, working hard with our teachers. We are excited about a few new programs we are implementing for the first time. We always look for ways to improve our curriculum so that our students can continue to grow to high levels.

The first is an online reading program: Scientific Learning's *Reading Assistance*. This program will be used for students in Kindergarten through 12th Grade. The program is basically an individualized reading tutor. The student uses a headset with a microphone to read aloud. They start off with an initial reading assessment, and the results are used to assign various stories and activities that are appropriate for both their reading level and their age. As they read aloud into their microphone, the "tutor" helps them through words when the student either hesitates or struggles. Comprehension of their reading is also measured through a brief quiz after the reading selection. Students are given the opportunity to practice the words they struggled with in each selection so that they may increase their vocabulary. We are confident that we will see our students' reading levels grow with this new program. Becoming a proficient reader is an essential skill that impacts success in life beyond high school.

Another new program we are implementing this year involves work with our 10th, 11th, and 12th graders. Ludlow High School is partnering with NaviGo Prep Services to bring this college and career planning curriculum to PAWS time on Fridays. Ten teachers and five school and district administrators were trained by NaviGo staff to become coaches to LHS students. Students will meet with their NaviGo Coach three times per month, on Fridays during PAWS time. Coaches will work with students in small groups, starting in the 10th grade, to get them researching and planning for their life after high school. A new twist to this program is that groups will be made up of students who have similar career interests. Each career interest group will partner with an area business within that career cluster to get students on site and shadowing jobs in the field. Again, we know this program will be a huge asset to our students and parents, and we're excited to bring it to LHS this year. Our students will be better prepared to implement their plan for life after high school once they graduate. We are the first school district in Northern Kentucky to partner with NaviGo!

If you've read previous letters of mine, you'll know that the Dual Credit Program is one that is very important to me. I've worked with our Board of Education and many local sponsors (businesses, organizations, alumni, and community members) to expand these course offerings. We were successful this year by increasing the number of students taking these courses. Students take dual credit courses through Gateway and NKU, but they can take them right at Ludlow High School if they choose. Our English AP seniors will again participate in NKU's hybrid ENG 101 course in the spring. The new courses offered this year include NKU's Criminal Justice 101 and 231. One of our own faculty members, Michelle Combs, is now an Adjunct Professor through NKU and is approved to teach these college courses at LHS. The really exciting part about all of this is that the students can participate in these courses for free. Their tuition and textbooks are being provided for them. I feel that if students get involved in these kinds of courses in high school, they will feel better prepared for the college setting.

ASSESSMENTS TO TAKE PLACE IN SEPTEMBER

Two series of assessments take place in September at Ludlow Independent Schools. Both are designed to see our students' current levels in Language Arts, Reading, Math, and Science. This testing takes place so that results can be used early in the year to adjust instruction to meet the individual needs of the students.

The first series is MAP Testing (Measures of Academic Progress). Students in Kindergarten through 11th Grade are tested. Students will take these tests three times each year (fall, winter, spring). The fall test session starts on September 3rd and runs for about 10 days, although each student only tests for a few of those days. Each computerized test can last from 15 to 60 minutes, depending on the grade level, but the test itself is not timed. MAP Tests are adaptive; the difficulty of each question is based on how well a student answered the previous questions. As a student answers correctly, the questions become more difficult, but if the student answers incorrectly, the questions will again become easier. This adaptive nature of the test causes the system to truly pinpoint the achievement level of the student.

So then what? Teachers and parents can use the scores to monitor the growth of the student in each content area. Teachers adjust instruction in the classroom and use a variety of interventions to address the individual needs of their students. When the MAP results are

given to parents with the 1st Quarter Report Cards, a variety of activities will be suggested so that they can help their own son/daughter's growth.

One way we use MAP scores is by uploading them into the Compass Learning Program. Each student's score, along with their strengths and weaknesses in the tested areas, are uploaded. The program then builds a "backpack" for each student (grades K-8) in the Compass Program. The backpack contains special activities that will meet that particular student's level in the content areas. Students work in Compass at school, but they can certainly spend time at home on this free online tool too. Click on the "Student Resources" button on our webpage to see instructions for logging in.

MAP testing isn't mandated by the commonwealth of Kentucky as part of the required testing system. At Ludlow Independent Schools, we *choose* to incorporate it into our practice because we know the great value it has for our teachers and parents, and more importantly, our students. We look at it as more of a tool instead of a test. We use this tool to help our students get the specific targeted instruction they need so that each and every one of them can be on track to be college and career ready by the time they graduate.

The other series of tests taking place in September involves 8th and 10th graders only. The mandatory state test system requires that all 8^{th} graders take the EXPLORE Test and all 10^{th} graders take the PLAN Test. These tests are grade-appropriate versions of the ACT, which all juniors take each March (and encouraged to do so again as seniors). Ludlow's 8th graders take the EXPLORE Test on September 17th, and the sophomores will participate in the PLAN Test on September 18th. These are timed tests, taken with paper and pencil, just like the ACT.

Again, results will be used to adjust instruction to meet our students' needs. The purpose of the EXPLORE and PLAN tests is to see if students are on track to perform well on the ACT, meeting the required benchmarks for college readiness and college admissions. The EX-PLORE and PLAN tests are good predictors of a student's ACT score. Results for these tests will be returned to parents with 2nd Quarter Report Cards, due to the later date they are returned to LHS.

We realize that all parents want to understand the test results and act accordingly, making sure that their son/daughter gets any extra support or enrichment they might need. More detailed explanations of results can be given to parents at Parent/Teacher Conferences, when teachers can sit down and talk with them one-on-one. All parents or guardians are encouraged to contact their school office or specific teacher(s) if they ever have questions concerning any testing or the specific test results.


